

After high school, Brooke attended Texas A&M University in Galveston. Once at TAMUG, she continued to stay active in organizations including the student government. Brooke did not intend to stay at TAMUG more than a year. Her plan was to transfer to College Station, but after her first semester in Galveston and traveling to Aggie football games (which she loved) she knew Galveston was where she wanted to be. The island life fit her. She thrived on the smaller campus, making many friends and enjoyed the opportunity to get to know her professors well.





Brooke graduated from Texas A&M Galveston in May of 2014 with a degree in Maritime Administration after 3 short years. That Aggie Ring was her motivation to take a heavy class load and get her ring as soon as possible which lead to an early graduation date. After graduation, she went to work for Kirby Offshore Marine. Brooke had such an impact with her loving spirit that shortly after her death in an auto accident in 2016, Kirby named a tugboat in her honor, the MV BROOKE CHAPMAN. The christening of the tugboat appropriately took place at her beloved Texas A&M University Galveston.

While Brooke was a dedicated student and employee, personal relationships were the most important thing to her. She was a constant reminder that true kindness still exists. Our wish is that each recipient of this scholarship knows the impact kindness can have on the world.
