Journey Learning Outcomes: 2.2 Adapt to Change



•Location: On Campus




Journey Learning Outcomes:

A barge slammed into the bridge in Galveston, Texas, on Wednesday, May 15th, spilling oil into the bay and forcing a shutdown of the span and prompting us to evacuate around 60 students both living in TAMUG housing and also in University Apartments. These students stayed at a hotel in Galveston where CL&L staff as well as staff in the Division of Student Affairs assisted in making sure these students had housing, food and activities to help with the stress level while waiting to hear of the results of the impact of the collision.


New Faces: Summer Intern Ja'Naylah Johnson Takes on Texas!



 tug industries are all included as recommended participants.

- Counseling & Career Services staff provided Optimum Performance training
 with the nearly 200 Texas A&M Maritime Academy Cadets taking part in the 2024
 Summer Sea Term Program. The focus of this training is maintaining health &
 wellness physically and mentally throughout the grinding 2 months at
 sea. Healthy choices around decision making pertaining to alcohol and other
 drugs was targeted specifically as all too often, one bad decision can quickly
 wreck up to 4 years of training and education for a young merchant mariner. The
 maritime industry needs highly trained and healthy mariners!
- The Disability Resources department at the main campus begins its transition to case management of all Galveston students using academic accommodations starting in June 2024. Our Ability Services staff are in the process of learning the AIM operating system and actively participating in weekly case management reviews for all TAMU affiliated satellites.
