Green Dot

- A new organization incentive has been developed for Green Dot. If an organization requests a Green Dot Overview for their organization, they will be entered to win one of two \$250 cash prizes into their org account. The office of student activities is helping to promote this new incentive structure.
- To promote the new org incentive, the Green Dot team partnered with Chartwells to host a cookie decorating event in Captains Landing on 2/11. Roughly 50 students stopped by to decorate cookies and hear about Green Dot.
- Krissy facilitated a Green Dot Overview for TAMUG AUV team on 2/19 at their organization meeting.
- We ordered and received 500 koozies to promote Green Dot. The koozies have a QR code that links to information about green dot, green dot overview request and local resources for reporting and care for victims of sexual abuse, assault or harassment.



Peer Educators

- Peer Educators continued to host programming throughout the month. Most notably, they
 hosted their annual Valentines themed Safe Sex Bingo on 2/13. The terms used for safe sex
 bingo were thoroughly evaluated and updated to provide more education on healthy sexuality
 and disease prevention.
- Peer Educators hosted Safe Mardi Gras on 2/18 where they provided education about safe drinking habits and personal safety ahead of Mardi Gras.


Wellness (+SWAG)

- There was a productive meeting with Gulf Coast Centers about identifying a suicide prevention gatekeeper training to "saturate" the TAMUG community with. We are currently trying to identify a date to host a "train the trainer" for Talk Saves Lives with American Foundation for Suicide Prevention so we can provide this training in house. This training will be open to members of the JED team but may be expanded.



Assessment/Outcome: Texas A&M University at Galveston recently welcomed 60 administrators from across the A&M System as well as Galveston County from institutions across Texas for the NABITA Behavioral Intervention Team (BIT) Standards and Best Practices Training and Certification Program. This training enhanced participants' ability to holistically support students by equipping their BIT with skills in threat assessment, case management, and early intervention strategies. By attending this program on our campus, staff gained valuable expertise to take back to their institutions, strengthening their ability to foster safer, more supportive learning environments.

Transfer Student Mix & Mingle


- Hosted Transfer Student Mix & Mingle with the 1973 Center.
