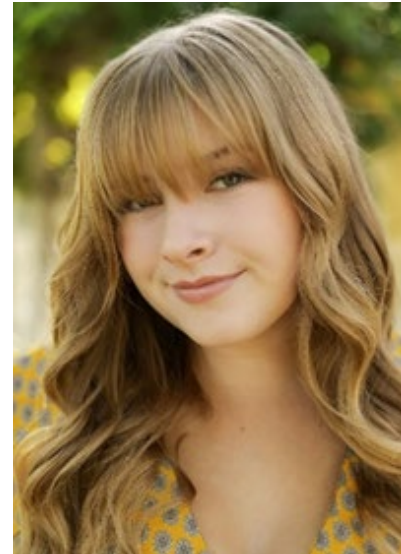
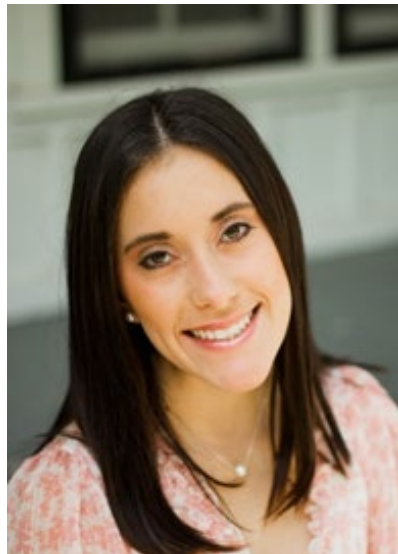
Public Policy Internship Program Representatives

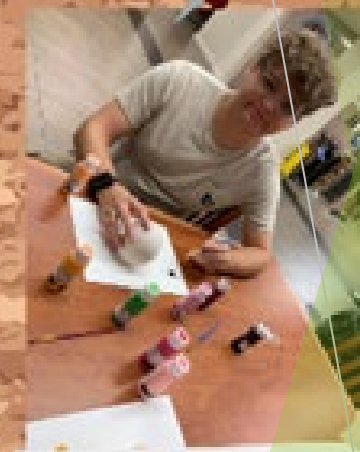
